An Líonra Sóisialta — le fáil mar mp3 podcast !

AN LÍONRA SÓISIALTA

Radio listeners across Ireland joined internet users worldwide recently, as they tuned in to the first episode of a new series focusing on the social aspects of the internet.



It's the first time an Irish radio series has been devoted exclusively to the phenomenon of "online social networking", of which the best known example in recent months has been Bebo. What's more: all 59 episodes of the show will be in Irish.

The programme is called An Líonra Sóisialta, which translates to The Social Network. It will broadcast a 12 minute episode each day for 12 weeks. So far, 7 Irish radio stations have confirmed that they will broadcast the show and its producer believes several more will join over the next few weeks as the series gathers steam.

Thanks to the internet, however, the show will be available to anyone who wants to hear it, anywhere in the world. An Líonra Sóisialta will also be a "podcast" – a downloadable MP3 sound file that users can listen to on their PC, or copy to a mobile device to enjoy at their convenience.

The new series is the brainchild of independent producer Conn Ó Muíneacháin from Ennis, County Clare. After a successful career in local radio, he gave up broadcasting for the computer industry. 10 years later, he sees the two fields converging as technology has put the media into the hands of anyone who has access to the internet.

Conn will co-present the show with Fiona Ní Chéirín, a native of An Spidéal, Co. Galway, and a recent graduate of the multimedia degree programme at Tipperary Institute. The series has been provisionally approved for funding under the "Sound and Vision" scheme operated by the Broadcasting Commission of Ireland.

Daonscoil 2007 — stories from the frontline

Bhí Rohan Walker agus Risteard Ó Súilleabháin i láthair ag an Daonscoil don chéad uair i mblíana. De réir dealraimh chuaigh an scoil i bhfeidhm orthu.

My first Daonscoil was an unforgettable experience. It was intensive and well organised but also extremely enjoyable. As well as the formal lessons in reading and writing, grammar and conversation, our immersion in the Irish language was enhanced by the electives, especially the singing classes.

There were also several group activities cleverly designed to make us concentrate on every word spoken in Irish by the more advanced speakers: the nightly Nuacht, Díospóireacht, Drámaíocht, Tráth na gCeist agus an Cheolchoirm.

All participants were inspired by the example set in the Nuacht on Monday night to maintain the running gag: “choimeád mé mo bhéal dúnta,” in spite of the fact that it could not have been further from the truth! Many of the first timers showed their enthusiasm by dancing and singing into the wee hours but still turning up for the first class next morning. Congratulations to the organizers !

Very many thanks to all involved in organising and running the 12th Daonscoil at Lady Northcote Camp. The accommodation and food was much better than the name “Camp” would suggest. We were four to a room in double bunks that were very comfortable. The bathrooms were clean and the showers hot. Each house had its own common sitting area which we used for classes. The day’s lessons were divided into three, starting with reading and writing with Barney, followed by Grammar with Stu and conversation with Eamonn. We then had our activity which for me was singing with Nóirín.

After dinner came the craic followed by a céilí that was always still going strong when I went to bed at 11.30. How they managed to get up at seven for Mass the next day I don’t know. Having had less than a year’s lessons I wasn’t sure that I was ready for anything so adventurous but it was the best thing I could have done. With such expert tuition, the useful handouts and surrounded by native speakers it has given my Irish a terrific boost. My advice to anyone who missed it is to put off anything else and join us there next year.
